
SOCIOLOGY // SUBJECT PREPERATION


Sociology refers to the study of the development, structure and functioning of society. We are interested in all aspects of society; education, healthcare, employment, crime and deviant behaviour, and religion - to name a few. We are interested in how all of these aspects of society work together (or not) and how they contribute to the benefit - or to the detriment, of society.

Sociology is an incredible subject, and a lot of the time what we are discussing and learning about has a very current presence in the media and society. QUESTIONS TO FIND ANSWERS TO

Below is a table showing **some** of the themes we look at on the course - as well as some "bigger picture" areas we as sociologists consider. Here are some questions for you to think about - or research! At the very least, they'll make for some interesting dinner table discussion!

GENDER	Are some genders more likely to experience illness than others?	Are some genders more likely to commit crime than others?	Are some genders more likely to be diagnosed with a mental illness?
ETHNICITY	Are some ethnicities more likely to experience prejudice in education?	Is all ethnic stereotyping negative in education?	Why are some ethnicities discriminated against in regard to crime?
CLASS	Are some classes more likely to experience illness than others?	Are some classes more likely to experience prejudice in education?	Are some classes more religious than others? Why?
CRIME & DEVIANCE	What makes something criminal? What makes something deviant?	Why do people commit crime?	Can something that is criminal not be seen as deviant? What examples can you think of?
HEALTH	What does it mean to be "healthy"? Is this idea universal?	Are all "physical" illnesses real?	Do we view all illnesses the same way?
RELIGION	Are we really becoming less religious?	Why are sects and cults so attractive to some people?	ls religion a positive or negative force in society?
MENTAL ILLNESS	Are all mental illnesses real?	Are there gender, ethnic and class specific disorders?	How easy is it to convince a doctor that you have schizophrenia?
EDUCATION	Are students labelled? Is this label always negative?	What are subcultures, and what types exist in education amongst pupils?	Why is there a significant difference in educational achievement between groups?



We place our trust and faith into healthcare professionals...but they make mistakes too. And sometimes, in some places, more frequently than we would like...




A fantastic documentary looking at the historical, societal, political and cultural development of criminalisation and racism towards African Americans.

Offers an interesting explanation as to why there are greater numbers of African Americans incarcerated than other ethnic groups.






Here are our book recommendations! Some may be easier to find than others, however summaries and extracts can be found online for free!
