# School Council Litter Pick Up

Mr Tatum's assembly this week was about 'Care for our Common Home' in which he linked Pope Francis's papal encyclical Laudato si' with the forthcoming COP26 conference in Glasgow (in November) and environmental matters closer to home - the school field!

Throughout this academic year, the Student Council have also been keen to do something to improve our school environment and proposed an after school 'Litter Pick'. So, on Thursday 19<sup>th</sup> May eighteen students ranging from Years 7 – 12 chose to give up some of their own time to conduct a 'deep clean' of the school field.



It was fantastic to see the students identify a problem, propose a solution and take action to rectify it. Fuelled by some post-school refreshments to keep their energy levels up, the students divided up into year group bubbles and set to work clearing the school field and concentrating on the edges and corners where the wind-blown litter gathers.

They devised their own competitions along the way to keep them motivated by seeing how many bags they could fill, who could fill the heaviest bag and who could find the wrapper with the oldest sell by date. In the end they managed to fill an incredible 12 bags of rubbish. Along the way they managed to find a ball, a Christmas decoration and a locker key!

While the vast majority of our students are very responsible when it comes to disposing of their rubbish, the amount of litter showed that there is still room for improvement. Part of the problem is to do with excessive packaging and the Student Council would like to urge students to use re-usable containers, wrappers and drinks bottles to reduce the amount of rubbish that finds its way on to the field.

On a slightly different but connected issue, the Student Council raised a concern about the nonrecyclable containers and cutlery used in the canteen. The Senior Leadership Team quickly responded to this issue and have now moved to recyclable versions. As Pope Francis wrote in Laudato si', 'Young people demand change. They wonder how anyone can claim to be building a better future without thinking of the environmental crisis and the suffering of the excluded.'

At the end of Mr Tatum's thought-provoking assembly, he threw down four challenges for the St Benedict's community: Never walk past litter; Deep clean of the school field; Reduce the environmental impact of the school; Respect out surroundings. The Student Council have already made some progress regarding these, but sustained change can only be achieved by everyone playing their part.

## **Charity Haircuts**

Over this last week some students and staff have noticed Mrs Berry has changed her hair style. She had joined with three others to cut off their hair to send off to the Little Princess Trust to
