On top of all these challenges and demands, we have after school sports clubs, school council meetings and exhibitions of student art work all taking place and I can only thank and praise the staff who have sought to do the most for our students despite the challenges and constant additional demands. We all hope that we are nearing the end of these trickier days and that the summer will bring sunnier days in every respect.

Year 12 art students enjoyed the spectacular exhibition at Moyses Hall this week to take in famous original artworks by the likes of Banksy, Damien Hirst,



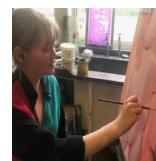
Blek LeRat, Tracy Emin and Rachel List.

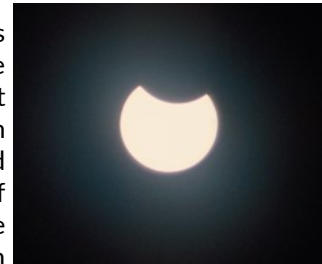

## Astronomy News

The long days of summer are not ideal for stargazing as, even for night owls in the early hours of the morning, the night sky never darkens completely. However, last week (Thursday 10<sup>th</sup> June) we had an opportunity for a bit of stargazing during the day – at our very own Sun, with appropriate precautions, obviously!

Because the relative movements of the Earth, Sun and Moon are known precisely, we can predict their interactions. The best known being eclipses, both solar and lunar. Yesterday the alignment of the Moon directly between the Earth and the Sun produced an Annular Eclipse. This differs from a Total eclipse in that, because the Moon is a bit further away from us in its orbit at this particular time, the Moon does not obscure the exact disk of the Sun but leaves a “ring” of light around its edge – the so-called “ring of fire”.



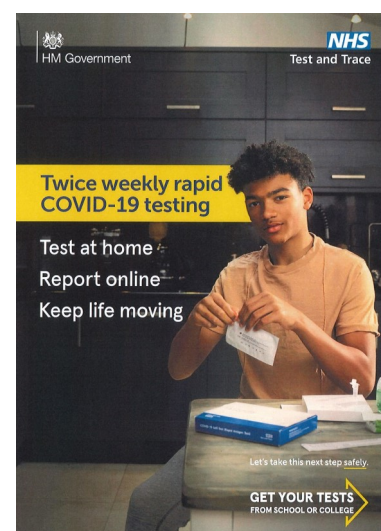
Sadly for us, the full annular eclipse was only visible in parts of northern Canada, Greenland and Russia. What we got was a Partial Eclipse. This is when only a part of the Moon passes between us and the Sun – in yesterday's case, from Bury St Edmunds, 20% of the Sun's disk was obscured at maximum. Our view of the eclipse was due to begin at 10:10 and end at 12:25, with maximum at 11:15. As history now knows, we were clouded out....but not completely.

Keeping an eye on the clouds, at 11:35 they thinned just enough for us to catch a fleeting glimpse of the Sun's disk in silhouette with a characteristic “bite” out of it (see photo). Later, at 12:10 the clouds parted completely giving a direct view of the eclipse, using specially approved “solar eclipse glasses” for safety. So, at least to the writer of this piece, all was not lost.

Let's hope for better viewing weather for the next partial eclipse visible from the UK: October, next year.

## Market Day



Business Studies students will be hosting a Market Day on Tuesday 13 July during the lunch break. They are working hard to make as much profit as possible by considering some of the most interesting business ideas. Besides the usual foods on sale, there will be other items on sale that may be of interest to you. So, come along, bring lots of money and support St. Bennie's Budding Entrepreneurs.

Profits will be donated to a nominated charity and there will be three categories of winners who will be awarded cash prizes as follows:

1st Prize: The team who makes the biggest profit will receive 30% of all profit.

2nd Prize: The team with the best marketing campaign will receive 20% of all profit.

3rd Prize: The team that displays the best team working spirit will receive 10% of all profit.

The remaining 40% of all the profit will be given to a charity nominated by all the students.

Students will work in teams of 2 or 3 to market and sell a product they believe will make them the most money. Ideally, the products will be hand-made, but all types of products will be considered.
