Inter Form Cross Country Championship





The weather was uncharacteristically warm and sunny for this year's Inter Form Cross Country Championships, which were held on the school field on Tuesday 21st September.

The Year 13 PE students did a fantastic job of setting up the course, ready for the evening's races. It was great to see so many students from St Benedict's and St Edmund's volunteer to stay behind after school to participate.

The first race was the Y6/7 race, which consisted of one big and one small lap (2,000m). It wasn't long before a small group of athletes began to lead the race out. Archie Coogan worked hard to establish a gap between him and his fellow 7S teammate Harry Gladstone. In the final stages, although Harry started to regain some of the lost ground, Archie gained a second wind in the home straight to sprint to victory with only five seconds between them. George Wellman from 7S also finished strongly to seal third place. Close packing from the 7A team denied 7S the team victory with Freddie Scott finishing seventh and Seamus Gallagher just behind in ninth.

Not to be outdone, the top girls weren't far behind. On the first lap Mr Wallace's elite 7L squad of Eliza Ionescu, Molly Murphy and Eleanor Slater headed to the front. Going into the long lap Eleanor put in an effort to take the lead with Molly close behind. These positions remained unchanged in the second lap although the gaps widened, with Eleanor finishing in ninth, Molly fourteenth and Eliza twentieth. Kiera Swarbrick finished in twenty-ninth position which meant that 7L emerged as victors in the team competition.

We were really pleased to invite St Edmund's students to our cross-country championships for the first time and were amazed by how well they performed. Raoul and Thomas finished in twelfth and thirteenth positions overall; followed by William 17th, Nina 21st, Ella 23rd and Oscar 25th. With another year's experience they will be vying for the top places!

The next athletes to toe the starting line were Year 8/9 who had an additional long lap to complete (3,200m). Kuba Kluczynski hit the front from the starting whistle and ran a commanding race to finish first, with Thady Ginders-Coxhall only marginally getting the better of Harrison Davy in a fiercely contested sprint finish for silver and bronze. Of the

Y9 Girls Peggy Claydon and Nancy Bailey also had a close race to finish in eight and ninth places.

Perhaps the best performance of the day came from Eva Torfinn (Year 8) who finished fifth overall in the Y8/9 race to win the Y8 Girls' competition. She was followed by Violette Davy in tenth and Ciara Evans in thirteenth.

Having watched and supported the younger students, it was then the turn of the Y10 – 13 students to put all their training into practice. On the first lap, a peloton of 12C students made a tactical decision to go early in the hope that they could guide their top new signing Samuel Evans to victory. Having acted as domestiques, the 12C team then left Sam to it safe in the knowledge that completing the race would be enough to take home gold in the team competition, with Will Cameron side-stepping his way to finish 8th closely followed by Liam McGlone in 9th and Krzysztof Mikulski in 10th.

Nathan White (11X), Santiago Davies (11L) and Harry Fasey (10S) were neck and neck for most of the race, but eventually finished in this order in second, third and fourth positions with only six seconds between them. Having helped to set up the course and assisted at the finishing funnel, Y13 students Malcolm Easton and Ben Tooley were content to finish in sixth and seventh positions overall to finish in gold and silver positions in the Upper Sixth Boys' race.

The Y10/11 Girls ran extremely well with Katie Kovecs (11X) finishing twelfth overall for first Y11 girl, followed by Marta Grzegorczy and Bea Price in thirteenth and fourteenth for first and second year 10 girls, and Charlotte Humphrey in fifteenth for second Y11 girl.

The evening's excitement seemed to come and go in a flash as the students drifted away after their races, content in the knowledge that they had pushed themselves and tried their hardest. The races also served as a trial for the school teams for the Suffolk Schools Area race on the 14th October at the Royal Hospital School in Ipswich – the team selections will be announced shortly.
