During this time of Advent and in light of the current news, we have made contact with Suffolk Refugee Support (SRS) to see how we can offer assistance.

One of the ways SRS identified that we could help is finding one-day-a-week volunteering opportunities for refugees, particularly those aged 16-19.

Suffolk Refugee Support was established in 1999 to help refugees / asylum seekers by offering advice and support to facilitate better access to education and employment among other things.

In 2019 there were 2 million asylum claims globally and the UK received 35,566 asylum claims. Whilst asylum seekers wait to be granted 'Leave to Remain', they are not allowed to work or claim mainstream benefits, but they are permitted to apply for housing and receive £39.60 per week to live on.

In the coming months we will continue to explore a number of ways to help SRS.

To begin with please look at your workplace and consider whether it might be a suitable environment for a one-day-a-week volunteer. This kind of opportunity will be vital for any asylum seekers to be taken seriously in the job market.

On Saturday 27th November 18 St Benedict's students ran in the Suffolk Schools A Race, having qualified by finishing in the top 50 at the area championships at the Royal Hospital School in October. This meant that they were running against the top 100 - 150 runners in the county in their age groups.



Enrichment Project in A Level Chemistry

Over the last half term our A Level Chemistry students have been expanding their practical skills and investigating the world of perfumery. We started the term by learning how essential oils are extracted by steam distillation and over a number of lunchtimes we extracted and purified orange oil from oranges, eugenol (a local anaesthetic) from cloves, lavender oil from lavender flowers and rosemary oil. Later in the year we will be visiting a perfumery laboratory where we will be able to use their mass spectrometry equipment to analyse the purity of the samples we extracted.



From this we decided that it would be interesting to see if we could design and manufacture our own St Benedict's Christmas fragrance. The students researched the chemicals that are used in common Christmas fragrances, such as Cinnnamal (the aldehyde that gives cinnamon its distinctive scent) and we then sourced the raw materials needed to design our own fragrance.

This involved the students making up many different samples varying the composition, deciding upon a shortlist and then using homemade fragrance testers (wooden spills used for lighting bunsen burners) to survey students and

staff to come up with a final scent.

For the past week our students have been manufacturing ethical scented candles which would make an ideal stocking filler this Christmas using 100% plant based wax and wicks, our homemade St Benedict's fragrance and repurposed glass jars and labelling designed by our art students, ensuring that the carbon footprint of these candles is as close to zero as possible.



The candles will be on sale as of next week and 100% of the proceeds will go to DePaul https:// uk.depaulcharity.org/ to help young people who find themselves homeless or at risk of homelessness.
