Intermediate Maths Challenge (IMC) 2022

The IMC is a 60-minute, multiple-choice competition aimed at high ability Maths students across the UK. It encourages mathematical reasoning, precision of thought, and fluency in using basic mathematical techniques to solve interesting problems.

We are delighted to announce that students at St Benedict's achieved 6 golds, 4 silvers and 5 bronzes in this year's IMC! To recognise the highest performers in the Challenge, UKMT awarded the top-scoring 60% of participants Bronze, Silver and Gold certificates in the ratio 3:2:1. Following this challenge, UKMT have invited 1500 of the highest performers to take part in one of three British Mathematical Olympiads, Adam John has qualified for a place in the Maclaurin Olympiad. Around 8000 will take part in the Pink Kangaroo, and Phoebe Harpur-Davies, Catherine Dunn, Oscar Lyons, Raphael Spiller and Taylor Valach have qualified for this. These exams will take place later this month. We are so proud of the achievements of all our pupils that took part in the Intermediate Maths Challenge.

PI Day March 14th

Monday 14^{th} March is Pi Day. It is celebrated around the world in the 3^{rd} month on the 14^{th} day as it is the first digits of pi (3.14). Pi is the ratio of the circumference of a circle to its diameter. In other words, pi equals the circumference divided by the diameter (π = c/d) The value of pi has been calculated to many millions of decimal places, to no readily apparent pattern.

At St Benedict's we will be celebrating pi day on Monday with some whole school activities. Every Maths lesson on Monday will include a pi activity. There will be pi puzzles and crafts in E2 at lunchtime. Also we will be running 3 competitions open to all students to participate in throughout the week.

Competition 1: Treasure Hunt.

Look for the clues around the school and answer the maths questions. The answers will all be digits of Pi. Write the answer to the maths question and the location in the school on a piece of paper. There are ten questions to find, can you find them all?!

Competition 2: Pi Day Problem Hunt.

How many maths problems can you find in the correct order within the digits of pi? You can use any Maths operations. For example, 3.1415, 4 + 1 = 5. Write a list of as many as you can find.

Competition 3: Pi Ku Poem.

Write your own Hai-ku poem to the number of syllables for the first 3 digits of pi. Hence the name Pi-ku poem! Line 1: 3 syllables, Line 2: 1 syllable, Line 3: 4 syllables. Link the theme of your poem to Maths and Pi.
