Suffolk's UK Youth Parliament Elections February 2022

We are extremely proud to announce that three of our Year 11 students, William Blewitt, Catherine Dunne and Ailish Kemble, ran as candidates in Suffolk's UK Youth Parliament Elections and have been elected as Members of the Youth Parliament for Suffolk.

This is an astonishing achievement as they all made independent decisions to put themselves forwards as candidates. The application process consisted of completing a form explaining why they would like to be considered for the position and making a two-minute video outlining three issues that they feel passionate about and want to change in their area, region, nationally or even internationally.

Together, they comprised three out of the eight candidates and they only became aware of each other's applications when the 15-minute election video was sent to every school in Suffolk at the beginning of February. Voting took place throughout the month with a closing date of the 28^{th} February. Every school in Suffolk was invited to take part in the vote. At St Benedict's we ran the election in form groups and students ranked the candidates on a sliding scale from 1-8.

The results were announced on the 10th March and all three of our candidates were thrilled to find out that they had been elected. They will now remain in their posts for the next two years and will work with their MP, decision makers, councillors and local youth groups on the issues of greatest concern to their constituents.
