Ukrainian Christmas Celebrations

We have a number of students in school that wanted to share with us their Ukrainian Christmas. Festivities begin on Christmas Eve (6 January) and end on the Feast of the Epiphany. The Christmas Eve Supper or Sviata Vecheria (Holy Supper) brings the family together to partake in special foods and begin the holiday with many customs and traditions, which reach back to antiquity. The rituals of Christmas Eve are dedicated to God, to the welfare of the family,

and to the remembrance of ancestors.

A special service was held at St Edmundsbury Cathedral where members of the local community came together with the Ukraine community to celebrate.

Following the service the families then sit down to the holy supper which is prepared by the whole family, it consists of 12 courses, each course is dedicated to one of Christ's Apostles, there is no meat, a Kolach or Christmas bread is placed in the centre of the table.

A didukh (meaning grandfather) is a sheaf of wheat

stalks or made of mixed grain stalks. It is placed under the icons in the house. In Ukraine, this is a very important Christmas tradition, because the stalks of grain symbolize all the ancestors of the family, and it is believed that their spirits reside in it during the holidays.



After the didukh is positioned in the place of honour, the father or head of the household places a bowl of kutia (boiled wheat mixed with poppy seeds and honey) next to it. Kutia is the most important food of the entire Christmas Eve Supper, and is also called God's Food.

A jug of uzvar (stewed fruits, which should contain twelve different fruits) and is called God's Drink, is also served.

The first course is always kutia. It is the main dish of the whole supper. Then comes borshch (beet soup) with vushka (boiled dumplings filled with chopped mushrooms and onions). This is followed by a variety of fish –



baked, broiled, fried, cold in aspic, fish balls, marinated herring and so on. Then come varenyky (boiled dumplings filled with cabbage, potatoes, buckwheat grains, or prunes. There are also holubtsi (stuffed cabbage), and the supper ends with uzvar.

It must have been an extremely moving experience for them , as we know that not all families were able to be together this year, we continue to pray for them during these troubled times.



Suffolk Schools Cross Country Final Race



The 'Final Race' of the Suffolk Schools Cross Country Championships took place on Thursday 12th July. We had a bumper crop of athletes qualify from the previous two rounds this year and, on the day, thirteen St Benedict's students competed against the cream of the cross-country runners in the county.

As we didn't have entrants in the Senior Girls event, the first to toe the starting line were Lucy Murphy (7P) and Imogen Grove (7L) in the Minor Girls race which comprised of one big lap (2400m) of the beautiful, albeit undulating, grounds of Woodbridge School. Many of the girls in the race set off at an incredibly fast pace, but Lucy and Imogen wisely chose to start more conservatively and work their way through the field, with Lucy finishing in 22nd position and Imogen in 49th.

Next up were the Minor Boys, who had to complete two slightly shorter laps (3200m). Once again Noah Wilkinson (7L) showed his class by finishing in a fantastic 12th position, ably supported by Oliver Lamas Nakagawa (7X), who also ran extremely well.

The Junior Girls ran exactly the same course as the Minor Boys, and despite having to run two laps both the boys and girls were pleased that they didn't have to run up the long hill to the Boarding House. All three of our students who ran were happy with their races. Molly Murphy (8L) was first Mrs Drabik home in 16th position, followed by Eleanor Slater (8L) in 34th and Emma Payne (9A) in 40th.

We fielded our largest squad in the Junior Boys race, which comprised of two laps including Boarding House Hill. Charlie Oxborrow (9C) ran strongly from gun to tape and was delighted to finish in 3rd place and receive a bronze medal. Paddy Matthews (9P) ran competitively to hang on to the leading pack to finish in 25th place. Both George Wightman (8A) and Archie Coogan (8S), who have another year in this age group, ran well and gained valuable experience to finish in 51st and 60th positions respectively.

Kuba Kluczynski (10C) and Taylor Valach (11C) ran in the three lap Inter Boys race (5700m). Kuba, who has competed in this race ever since he started at St Benedict's, ran brilliantly to finish in a fine 25th position. Taylor also ran strongly and should be very pleased with his 41st position, especially as he is currently managing an injury.
