Astronomy Group Event- Coloured Stars!

Yesterday evening (Thursday 16th March) the school's Astronomy Group hosted a presentation in the Drama Studio. Unfortunately the weather was against us and we

could not make use of our LangleyNewtonian telescope after sundown; however, we did have the benefit of the presence of Mr Derek Langley himself, our benefactor on behalf the Vinten Trust – more about Mr Langley later.



The event was open to staff, students and parents and was attended by a loyal group of 8 families with keen year 7 and 8 student astronomers, many of whom had come to our last meeting in December. Sadly, the guest speaker Dr Matt Bothwell from Cambridge University was unable to come due to a last minute family medical emergency. However, a backup plan was in place and the Group was given a presentation entitled "Coloured Stars". Most might think that all the stars we see when we look up at night are just pinpoints of white light all the same, just differing in brightness. But no! Get your eyesight adjusted for night vision and, if you know where to look, some stars take on a very distinctive colour.

The Group heard about the famous "twinkling star", Sirius, with its white dwarf companion; the blue-white giant that is Rigel; the yellow giant that is Capella, a system that is not just one star but four; Aldebaran, an orange giant that is the "eye of the Bull" in the constellation Taurus. The star of the show was, of course, Betelgeuse, the red super giant in the constellation Orion, the mythical Hunter.

Betelgeuse is known to be near the end of its life as a star and will eventually "explode" as a supernova. A few years ago astronomers thought that we were witnessing the beginning of this event as Betelgeuse dimmed significantly. As it has turned out, Betelgeuse has brightened up again so still has some life left in it. But it caused us to ponder the question of how our own Sun will end its life – and what will happen to the planet Earth.

Back to Mr Derek Langley – although the weather prevented us deploying our main telescope, Mr Langley had thoughtfully brought his own, more mobile, reflector telescope and, following the main



presentation, he gave the Group a tutorial that included important general advice on starting up in observational astronomy.

Thanks go to our own Mr Cameron-Laker, a keen Group member, for his help in setting up the audio-visuals in the Studio. Also to Mr Steward, formerly of this parish, who remains a staunch supporter of our Astronomy Group.
