Mr Elmer Alumni Visit

On Monday 23rd March, alumni Stephen Dunne visited St Benedict's to talk to the Year 12 Politics students about his career in the Civil Service.

Following his graduation from Oxford University, Stephen that joined the Civil Service Fast Stream and has worked in several departments in Whitehall including the Cabinet Office, the Ministry of Defence, the Department for International Development and is currently working at the Treasury.

The students were enthralled by his presentation about the Civil Service and the various postings he has completed so far, especially by his explanation of one of his more recent assignments to advise on the reduction of foreign aid from 0.7% of gross national income (GNI) to 0.5% which represents a cut of between about £4bn - £5bn depending on the size of the economy. Stephen sensitively outlined the issues surrounding this measure, which helped the students understand the complexities that the Treasury has to deal with.

Stephen also explained the importance of the Civil Service's core values of 'integrity', 'honesty, 'objectivity' and 'impartiality'. He concluded his presentation by saying how much he enjoyed working in such a demanding environment. The students really enjoyed his visit, and he has kindled an interest in several of the class members to find out more about the opportunities within the Civil Service. Mr Murphy
