The initial project in the Students will learn about the	Summer
10 students will focus on thetone, texture, pattern, colour, shape, composition and develop their skills experimenting with a range of media. Students will work on tasks that help them develop techniques for using watercolour, oil pastels, acrylics, chalk pastel, coloured pencils, charcoal, photo manipulation and ink. In the spring term students develop their design and composition skills using arange of 2D and 3D media.tone, texture, pattern, colour, shape, composition and develop their skills experimenting with a range of media. Students will work on tasks that help them develop techniques for using watercolour, oil pastels, acrylics, chalk pastel, coloured pencils, charcoal, photo manipulation and ink. In the spring term students develop their design and composition skills using relief-based print methods to produce lino, collograph and press print outcomes inspired by the printmaker Angie LewinStudent's investigations will finally move into three dimensions in the production of large scale structures using card construction techniques and paint and clay totone, texture, pattern, colour, shape, composition and develop their skills experimenting with a range of media. Students will work on tasks that help them develop techniques acrylics, chalk pastel, coloured pencils, charcoal, photo manipulation and ink. In the spring term students to produce lino, collograph and press print outcomes inspired by the printmaker	In the summer term students complete a mock exam to help them learn how to respond to the given theme of 'Figures, Faces, People. Students begin by exploring the work of Leonardo Da Vinci as a way of developing a deeper understanding of anatomy and proportions when drawing a human form or portrait. This project gives students the opportunity to demonstrate, through an extended creative response, their ability to draw together different areas of knowledge, skills and/or understanding from across their course of study. The students will sit a ten hour sustained mock exam period to create a study of a primary source portrait, making use of their understanding of how to paint skin tones, by using a range of different acrylic and watercolour painting techniques.

Assessment and Homework

Students will be assessed both for the portfolio of coursework that they produce throughout the course (60%) and for the final examination project (40%) in year 11. Every piece of work produced in class or at home contributes to the student's final grade. Written feedback is given on a regular basis at the back of students' sketchbooks to help support their learning as well as verbal feedback and direction in class.

Students final portfolios of work in year 11 are marked out of a total of 96 marks evenly distributed between the four assessment objectives below:

Students will be expected to complete a minimum of an hour a week for homework. However it is expected that those wishing to attain higher grades will put in considerably more time than this.

Homework is designed to be relevant to the units of work studied and students are encouraged to take responsibility for their own sketchbooks and equipment.

Extra and Super Curricular Opportunities

Students will have the opportunity to attend art club/catch up sessions after school every Thursday evening to gain further one to one support as they need it and develop their skills. Trips to galleries and museums are part of the two year course. Students visit the Botanical Gardens and Cambridge Museum's in Year 10 to provide stimulus for their initial projet.

Artists are often invited into the school to run extra-curricular workshops for example as part of the Royal Academy Masterclass scheme and also with local artists where possible for example through organisations such as the Bury Arts Society. Year 10 and 11 students would be invited to participate in these opportunities to extend their skills and find out more about pathways for careers in the arts.
